And so it's I, it became it's the first book that that was published widely that describes kind of this fascination that I have with understanding the Bible in its cultural context.

Great. What is your favorite archeological site to visit?

I have one in particular. That is the current dig at what is very likely B.C. to the fishing village on the Sea of Galilee. And the reason why it's my favorite is because I and I myself have been a part of it. And I tell you, as you mention it, even this morning on my Facebook, the first thing that popped up is their their most recent results.

So, yeah, I when I go there and I dig, I am literally powdering myself in the dust of his feet, which is what they tell you to do. Yes.

So for those that are questioning, it's this book right here that you can get Lois's book sitting at the feet of Rabbi Jesus pretty much anywhere books are sold to be able to to get this without actually having to go to the land and to start that interpretation and that understanding in your own walk.

And you actually find it in a very orthodox rabbi is even today is they love to quote little tiny snippets of scripture. And they'll do it not just a little bit, but a whole bunch of times. Girls are like pearls of wisdom and two string pearls is to string together words of scripture and with the assumption that people understand where they came from and if you know where they came from, you get this incredible wow.

When you see how they say something new. Mm hmm. One simple one that you in Jesus does this a lot. Yeah, I actually his father does this a lot. When he says when the heavens open and the dove comes down at the baptism, he says, you are my son, whom I love, with whom I am well pleased. Right.

And you say, well, that's nice. But you didn't say he didn't realize. God just quoted three different scriptures. He quoted Genesis 22. My my son, whom I love. He quoted Psalm two today. You are my son. You have to go read that in Isaiah. The last part is Isaiah 42. And this is my son who know behold my servant, with whom I am well pleased.

And and each one of those has a reference in a song to is this incredible kingly passage about the Messiah. And he's going to be the Son of God and he's going to rule the world. And if you know your scriptures well, which is what they did, the what we call our Old Testament, the Hebrew Bible was very, very well known.

And so the whole chapter is about the many, many times that Jesus puts in these little tiny hints and quotes from his scriptures that are really important for knowing what he's talking about. And that's that's the whole point of that chapter. Stringing pearls.

Yeah, great. Because I think in in teaching so many people have said to me, but I don't understand Hebrew, I don't understand the language. I don't I don't know. I don't understand or know how to get that information. Yeah. It's not a requirement to understand this. This way the Holy Spirit can interpret for us what these passages mean.

But I always explain that it gives it such a deeper, richer, fuller understanding when we can go back to that original context and the layering of the Scripture together. Mm hmm.

You know, we're I think people are drawn to the New Testament because there's a lot in there about Jesus and a lot of in there about the church and how to live. And if you go back, that's where the stringing the pearls comes in because you're able to see how those things are connected. And the Bible really is just one love story from beginning to end about restoration and redemption and and all those beautiful themes that go from the beginning to the very end.

Amen. Great. Very well said. Perfect.

Well, okay. This is a the word. The word Talmudic is actually plural of to mean a to me is a disciple and a learner who learns from a rabbi. And it helps us understand those scenes of Jesus inviting men. Jesus, come follow me. And if you have no context, you say, Wow, Jesus is like the Pied Piper. It's because of his glowing halo, you know, this big glowing thing.

Well, I would follow that to just to figure out what's up with that is, of course, because Jesus is the son of God. Well, why wouldn't he glow? Why not? Well, actually, there was a context. People were actually already doing this. The first century Jewish culture actually already had a tradition of educated laypersons, not necessarily priests, or they they haven't gone through some seminary, but they have been studying and teaching in their synagogues.

And they would be invited to travel to other synagogues and teach there. Well, they would in between when they were teaching, they would often be holding sessions for students, people who were fascinated and wanting to learn along with them. And so there would be very obvious laypeople. This was a fasting nation among everybody. It's kind of as much as we're passionate about football.

They were passionate about understanding the Torah. How do we live this out? What is it about? And so and there were a few, just a few who would say, boy, I'm going to devote my time and follow you everywhere you go. And so there's actually some there are other stories of a rabbi with his to tell me team or maybe and then maybe another rabbi.

And they would get up and go to the town down the way in order to teach in their synagogue or do some business. And the students, then they would have a conversation about some important line in the Torah. One actually is a discussion of the same thing that, you know, Jesus talks. There's a passage where it says some of Jesus's disciples were plucking the heads of grains on the Sabbath.

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Lois

This actually they're having that same conversation because they're also walking and plucking grains or it happened recently. And so it's fascinating to see these parallel stories. So that's it's interesting because it gives you a context of what actually was this was expected of disciples. And when Jesus says raise up or he says, go make disciples of all nations, well, we got it.

Know what that means? Right. So that's what is important. Yeah. Mm hmm. Yeah.

So it does tell you that people would spend chunks of time that they would that they you know, and when you see the disciples that sometimes they would be fishing nets and sometimes they'd be walking after Jesus. And I've seen people say, Oh, they did not have enough faith. They should always walk after Jesus and never fish. Hmm.

No, that's not true. You actually see disciple that they would they would have sessions for certain months, but then they would people would go off and harvest their fields and then they would come back. You see many scenes that are reminiscent of Jesus's teaching by the galley or in the marketplace. You see things like that. Disciples were so opposed to emulate Elijah and Elijah.

You remember how Elijah, when Elijah called Elijah, Elijah burned his plow in order to show his commitment. And Jesus, you know, when some guy says, Oh, I will be your disciple, but I want to have to bury my father first. And he says, anybody who puts his hand to the plow and then looks back is not worthy of the Kingdom of God.

Well, there you go. There's your context.

Yeah. Let's talk through for a few minutes some differences between an eastern view of discipleship and a Western view of discipleship, because they're they're pretty vast at times. Sure. So what are what do you see as some differences?

It was right around this time that the Greeks kind of took over the world and came up with this new way of doing things. And Europe and America and the modern West, that's what we call the West. Our American ways are the Western ways. The way we think is Western. That's a long discussion of its own. But the Greeks love to think.

They love to think about thinking. They they love love, love to think about thinking. And and so that's what when you see, we assume that to be disciple was would be to take a class that would teach you proper doctrines and systematic theology.
